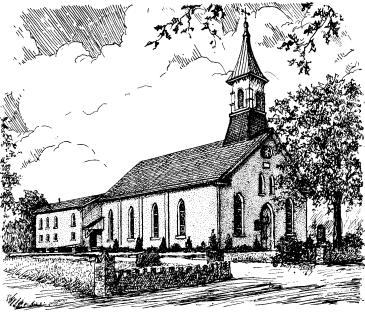

REV. JOHN'S MUSINGS.

A city dweller moved to a farm and bought a cow. Sometime after the purchase, the cow went dry. When he reported this fact to a neighbor farmer, the neighbor expressed surprise. The city slicker explained, "I don't understand it either, for if ever a person was considerate of an animal, I was of that cow. If I didn't need any milk, I didn't milk her. If I only needed a quart, I only took a quart.

The farmer tried to explain to him that the only way to keep milk flowing is not to take as little as possible from the cow, but to take as much as possible.

Is this not true of the Christian life? Those who only turn to God in time of need miss the real joy that flows from a daily infilling of his Holy Spirit. Consider this parable about Irish Farmers, since we are in the season of Shamrock celebrations.

Many years ago Irish immigrants subscribed to the theory that they could eat all the big potatoes and keep the small potatoes for seed planting. They did this for quite some time. They ate the big potatoes; they planted the small potatoes. Soon, however, greater understanding of the laws of nature came to them, for while they kept up this practice, nature reduced all their potatoes to the size of marbles. The Irish farmers learned through bitter experience that they could not keep the best things of life for themselves and use the leftovers for seed. The laws of nature decreed that the harvest would reflect the planting season.

Planting small potatoes is still common practice today. We often try to keep the best things of life for ourselves and to plant inferior things. We expect that by some crazy twist of the laws of nature our own selfishness will reward us with unselfishness. Is this not true in terms of time, personal talents, serving others, sharing our faith, living according to the Golden Rule?

We need to remember what the Irish farmers learned: we cannot eat all the big potatoes and still keep on having them through the years. Truly the harvest reflects the planting season.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD SHOEBOXES

St. Luke’s has a goal to pack another 50 shoeboxes this year with a *special focus on boys and girls aged 10-14*. Here are some recommended items to look for while you’re out shopping.

A Wow Item--doll/doll accessory; toy truck or boat; soccer ball with pump; stuffed animal; clothing; small musical instrument
Personal care items
School supplies
Clothing and accessories
Crafts and activities
Toys

The following items cannot be accepted as donations: used or damaged merchandise; chocolate, candy or gum; food including seeds, fruit rolls or snacks or drink mixes; liquids or lotions; toothpaste; war-related items like toy guns, knives or military figures; breakable items like snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans. Don’t forget that it costs \$9 per box for shipping. If you would rather help defray mailing instead of donating objects, simply write “Shoeboxes” on your Sunday offering check.

Support **One Great**
Hour of Sharing.

On Sunday, March 31st we will participate in One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) as part of Our Churches Wider Mission (OCWM). It's the annual special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

In 2017, the OGHS offering was over \$2 million. Nearly 65% of UCC congregations participate annually. On average 95 cents of every dollar is used directly for mission programming and 5 cents for interpretation materials. Administrative costs are paid by gifts to OCWM National Basic Support.

Sunday Leader Scheduling Note

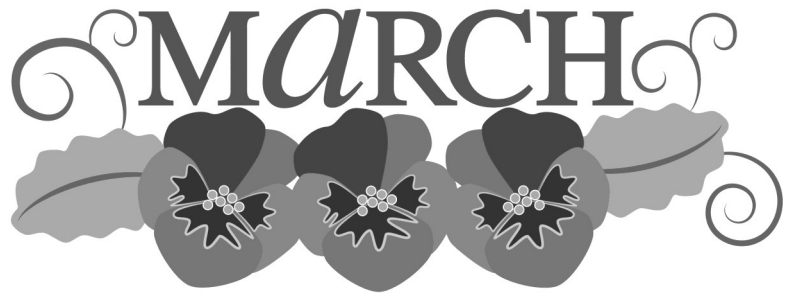
